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## **Director's Welcome**

*It has been extremely busy since the publication of our last newsletter in November. There have been many high points including productive meetings with the Council of Europe, the Children's Commissioner and ongoing discussions with the European Commission. We have also celebrated the success of one of our Community Development interns, Ann O'Donnell gaining a paid internship with the Equalities and Human Rights Commission.*

*On the negative side, ITMB were disheartened by the Channel 4 portrayal of Travellers in their "Big Gypsy wedding" series where it was clear that the series was not representative of many Travellers. As a result ITMB have seen a discernible upsurge in prejudiced incidents of racism towards Travellers, which have been reported to us and which we are trying to assist with.*

*Additionally, there has been more bad news with the decision taken by Basildon Council in favour of issuing the 28 day eviction notice period of Dale Farm. ITMB have set up a petition calling on the British Prime Minister to intervene. We would urge you to sign this and it will be handed in to Downing Street by residents of Dale Farm in the coming weeks.*

*Finally, we also said a fond farewell to Scott Philips, our capacity development officer in the North who has returned to the United States. We wish him all the best for the future.*

# Policy Corner

Since the last policy update in November, the policy team have been busy organising and attending a variety of events and many of the related reports are outlined in this newsletter such as the human rights family day.

We have also been making trips around the country, visiting various Traveller sites which is important in informing and feeding into, our policy briefings and research. In particular, we have made visits to Dale Farm to discuss with the families the impending evictions. We will also be using the Dale Farm situation as a case study in our Shadow report to the UN.

Another meeting which was particularly productive, was the recent Gypsy, Traveller, Roma All Party Parliamentary Group meeting held at the House of Commons in December. The theme of the meeting was Equalities and Human Rights.

ITMB gave a presentation to the group on the work that we are currently doing in raising awareness of the human rights and legal implications related to the GRT communities. In particular, our presentation focused on the work we are doing at the European and the International level in this regard, including our shadow report to the UN and also in terms of our engagement with senior officials at the European Commission. The aim of our presentation was to ensure we have the support of sympathetic British politicians in our European and International policy engagement.

ITMB were also involved in the Panel Review of Government Policy on Gypsies and Travellers, organised by Travellers Trust Aid and the policy team gave evidence before the panel. The two days covered Accommodation, Planning and Enforcement, on Thursday 4 February, and Health, Children, Welfare and Education Issues related to accommodation on Friday 5 February. The report will be published in the coming months and ITMB eagerly await the findings of the panel.

Related to our European policy work, following a meeting with the Director of Equality at the European Commission, Belinda Pyke, she has agreed to meet with a delegation from the Irish Traveller Movement in Brussels, where we hope to pursue further some of the issues we raised with her at the initial meeting. In particular, we are keen to discuss the European use of the generic "Roma" term which encompasses Traveller and Gypsy groups.

We are also concerned that the European Institutions should take a stronger role in ensuring UK compliance with equality and Race legislation where the GRT communities are adversely affected. Linked to this ITMB have been invited to attend the next European Platform meeting where we will be feeding into the European wide Roma Strategy which is soon to be adopted by the EU Institutions in the coming weeks. In particular ITMB are keen to ensure that the focus of the national strategies is inclusive of Travellers as well as Roma and that the policy guidance is relevant to Travellers.

## Policy: Dale Farm Campaign

ITMB have set up a petition in response to Basildon Council's decision to issue a 28 day eviction notice for the forced removal of up to 300 residents from the largest Traveller site in the UK at Dale Farm, Essex.

ITMB are calling upon the PM to stop the forced eviction until satisfactory and culturally appropriate accommodation is identified and secured. If the eviction goes ahead, it will represent the largest ever eviction of Gypsies and Travellers in the UK.

There are particular concerns about the impact of eviction on the welfare and well being of up to 150 children and vulnerable adults. ITMB met with the Deputy Children's Commissioner in order to raise our concerns about the seeming lack of provision for the children and regarding our dissatisfaction with assurances given by Basildon Council in prior correspondence with the Children's Commissioner. Following this meeting, Basildon was then contacted by the Office of the Children's Commissioner who expressed concern that the Council has 'no plan proposed for ensuring that the health, welfare, education, housing and other needs of the children involved will be protected.'

The All Party Parliamentary Party for Gypsy Roma Travellers has also expressed serious concerns over the planned eviction and has called on all parties to find a long term sustainable solution to the issue. The UN has also expressed grave concerns about the prospect of eviction

Basildon Council must abide by their statutory equality duties and respect Dale Farm residents' rights to health care, education and accommodation.

Any eviction will leave families homeless and result in increased unlawful encampments in Basildon and elsewhere in the UK. The cost of developing alternative sites for the residents of Dale Farm would be much less than the cost of the eviction. Various figures have been quoted in the press about the costs of the operation – a minimum of £3M for the eviction and £5M for the police and possibly twice as much.

Basildon Council and Dale Farm residents were previously involved in mediation facilitated by the Equality and Human Rights Commission. There is still the opportunity to identify suitable land which could meet the accommodation needs of the Dale Farm residents. There are opportunities for making alternative provision through a Community Land Trust scheme. We urge David Cameron to intervene and ensure an alternative and culturally appropriate solution is found in order that the residents are not forcibly and violently evicted from their own land in Dale Farm.

## Policy: Council of Europe meeting

ITMB were invited to meet the delegation from the Council of Europe Advisory Committee on the Ethnic Minority Framework Convention during their recent monitoring visit of the UK which took place in March. At the meeting, ITMB presented key concerns in relation to current Government policies which are adversely affecting the GRT communities in the UK. ITMB also highlighted the specific policy areas where these policies have resulted in a failure to comply with the particular provisions of the Framework Convention which the Government has signed up to. In particular, this is demonstrated in the

areas of accommodation, education and health. ITMB used the opportunity to raise the particular case of Dale Farm along with colleagues from the Human Rights clinic at Essex law school who were also in attendance at the meeting. Following our meeting, the advisory committee delegation then went directly on a visit to Dale Farm. Feedback with the delegates was extremely positive following the meeting, and it is hoped that this will result in a number of strong concerns and recommendations about the treatment of GRT communities in the UK, in the forthcoming report they will publish on the UK.

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## ITMB responds to My Big Fat Gypsy Wedding

Following the hugely popular series My Big Fat Gypsy Wedding the Irish Traveller Movement in Britain (ITMB) called upon Channel 4 to give Britain's Gypsies and Travellers air time for a right of reply.

ITMB Director, Yvonne MacNamara described the Channel 4 documentary series as having:

*'Left all of us extremely disappointed and angry at the very narrow portrayal of the Gypsy and Traveller communities.*

*We are hearing every day distressing accounts from parents whose children are being bullied and called names, venue bookings being cancelled, we are hearing about the deep sense of embarrassment and shame many have been left with by such a narrow, misrepresentative and unjust portrayal of their community and culture.'*

In response to ITMB's call for a right of reply – and its widespread coverage in national media – Channel 4 have agreed to a meeting with Gypsies and Travellers and representative organisations.

ITMB believe the selective and extreme examples used in the series need to be contextualised and Britain's Gypsy and Traveller communities given the opportunity to accurately and fairly describe their diverse cultures and beliefs.

A recent ITMB research report on Gypsies and Travellers economic and social inclusion highlighted the diverse range of work and life experiences and practices within the communities. Such diversity of experience was sadly not captured in My Big Fat Gypsy Wedding.

# Policy:

## Human Rights Family Day



On Tuesday 14th December, the Irish Traveller Movement in Britain (ITMB) in partnership with the British Institute of Human Rights (BIHR) along with Friends of the Earth (FOE) put on a Traveller Community and Human Rights Day at Westminster Catholic Cathedral as part of the wider Human Rights and poverty project between ITMB and BIHR.

With approximately 50 people that turned up including children, the day was very successful. There was a separate room where children's activities were in full force!

This catered for around 20 children where they were able to paint their hands and make hand prints. The prints were then joined together to make a tree! Fairies for their Christmas trees were also made as well as other decorations for Christmas.

There was a mass said by Monsignor John Arbitrage which was very engaging in which he spoke directly on some of the sensitive issues facing Travellers today.

An interactive theatre piece was performed on the day by Cardboard Citizens which had really positive feedback. The day also included BIHR facilitating a session in the afternoon along with Friends Of the Earth which led to interesting discussions and lots of interaction with the community members that attended the day.

The event was also attended by a very special guest known as Santa. Santa joined in on the family day during lunch with the children. As you can imagine they were all excited about seeing him! Each child received a present. There were two Elves to assist Santa. There was a good, Christmassy atmosphere.

# Policy: CERD Update

ITMB are currently drafting the Shadow Report which will be submitted to the UN CERD committee in consideration of its examination of the UK periodic reports submitted by the British Government earlier last year.

The drafting of the final report is being guided by a national steering committee comprised of experts including Lord Avesbury, Lord Dubs, Arthur Ivatts OBE, Prof Luke Clements, Brian Foster as well as organisations including Runnymede and the British Institute of Human Rights.

The report will closely follow and address the policy areas that the Government have referred to Travellers in their submission and will include accommodation, education, health, Criminal justice as well as general racism and discrimination of the GRT communities including with reference to the media.

Associated with this, ITMB are currently in the process of sending out a consultation to all of our stakeholders asking for input into the report, in terms of evidence or thoughts on the relevant questions and issues which the report should be addressing. We would be very grateful for any input that any of our stakeholders can give us for the report.

The report will be submitted in July for consideration by the UN CERD committee in its August session. It is hoped that ITMB will be able to attend a pre-booked lunchtime meeting with the committee in Geneva as part of a coalition of NGO's which have secured a slot to present our findings to them. We have already met with the Irish Representative on the CERD committee who gave us valuable advice on the report and the hearing process in general.

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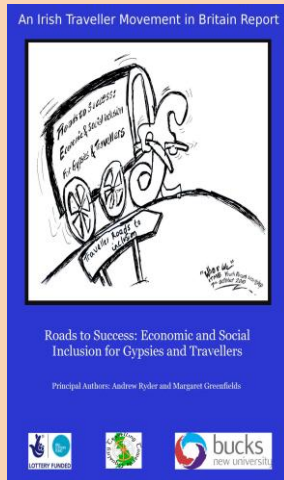
## Gypsy Roma Traveller All Party Parliamentary Group

A meeting of the APPG took place in December, on the theme of human rights and equality. At this meeting, there were presentations given by the Equality and Human Rights Commission, the Derbyshire Gypsy Liaison group and ITMB on various equality issues facing Gypsies and Travellers in the UK. ITMB in its presentation, outlined the key work that we are doing in raising these issues at

the European and International level. ITMB emphasised the importance of ensuring accountability comes from the International level when the UK Government is not complying with its legal obligations with regard to the treatment of Gypsies and Travellers in the UK. Related to this, ITMB gave the group an update of the various initiatives we are involved with and asked for support from the members.

## Gypsy/Traveller census 2011: Stand up and be counted

The next census is of great historical importance for Irish Traveller communities in England and Wales: for the first time, the questionnaire will allow people to mark their ethnic identity as 'Gypsy or Irish Traveller'.

The new option for people to tick 'Gypsy or Irish Traveller' has come after many requests from Travellers and support groups. With space on the forms limited, while 20 new groups were considered

for recognition in the 2011 census, only Travellers and Arabs were added. Some people may be worried about providing personal information, but no personal information will be released for 100 years.

For people on sites, questionnaires will be hand-delivered. A helpline and other support are available for anyone who needs it.

The team organising the census hopes that Irish Travellers will not only complete the census for the sake of their families, but be proud to tick the box marking their ethnic identity. For more information, visit [www.census.gov.uk](http://www.census.gov.uk)

# Policy:

## Localism Bill

On December 13<sup>th</sup> 2010 the Coalition Government released its Localism Bill, the blue print for the Prime Ministers 'Big Society'. The Government have stated that the Bill 'will put an end to the hoarding of power within central government and top-down control of communities, allowing local people the freedom to run their lives and neighbourhoods in their own way.'

While not wholly adverse to the concept of 'localism', ITMB questions how Gypsies and Travellers Human Rights to accommodation, education and healthcare will be protected under the Government's localism agenda. The Equality and Human Rights Commission (EHRC) has echoed similar concerns:

*'the Commission is concerned that with more private bodies and community groups taking on public service provision, there is a risk that these services may not in future be subject to the fundamental protections contained in the Human Rights Act (HRA) 1998, the new Public Sector Equality Duty (PSED) under the Equality Act 2010.'*

ITMB believes there is a serious danger that incidences of discrimination towards the Gypsy and Traveller communities could be exacerbated by certain measures in the Localism Bill. For this reason ITMB calls on the Government to ensure Gypsies and Travellers and other disadvantaged groups Human Rights are fully protected and respected under any future localism agenda.

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## ITMB research on Gypsy Traveller Government accommodation policy

ITMB are presently conducting an exciting new research project into the implications of the abolition of Regional Strategies and the Government's localism agenda on Gypsy and Traveller site provision. The research will cover all local authorities in the regions of the East of England, South East and South West giving us a valuable indication of national trends.

The research is in response to the Governments plans to replace the existing system for planning for Gypsies & Travellers. The Government intends to abolish Regional Strategies (often referred to as Regional Spatial Strategies) and replace them with a locally based planning system through the Localism Bill.

It also intends to replace ODPM Circular 1/06, Planning for Gypsy and Traveller Caravan Sites (and CLG Circular 04/07, Planning for Travelling Show people) with 'light touch guidance' as part of the proposed National Planning Policy Framework.

The ITMB research aims to inform the debate on how best to provide Gypsy and Traveller sites by pulling together evidence of the implications of the planned changes to inform representations to policy makers and influence the shape of the re-engineered system.

## Capacity Building: Project snapshots:

### Harrow Traveller

#### Inter-agency Forum

Within Harrow Borough there is a large population of Irish Travellers and there is currently no Inter Agency Forum up and running within the area, there was an Inter Agency Forum in place prior to this for a number of years which was very productive and meant a better understanding of the Traveller community, culture and their way of life, as well as the community members being more aware of the services they were able to have access to. This Inter Agency Forum sadly faded away because of lack of funding meaning the Traveller community took a step back within Harrow and the Inter Agency Forum was less encouraged and the meetings stopped happening.

Over the last two year ITMB have attended several meetings with service providers and community members to try and get this Inter Agency Forum re-established. The service providers were de motivated and the Travellers also lost their passion and thought it was easier to live with the gap between the two.

Harrow Council was holding events all over Harrow for all different communities and cultures. These events were called Let's Talk, it gave people a chance to come together and listen to some of the things that affected them and their community, have their say on the on the

issues and express their needs. ITMB worked with service providers in Harrow to hold an event which the Irish Travellers could come and talk about some of the issues they feel they face

within Harrow, as there is such a large number of Irish Traveller within the borough this was a great opportunity to bring both sides together and make those much needed links.

The event was held at The Harrow Civic Centre on the 25<sup>th</sup> November 2010 there wasn't a large representation there from the community for numerous reasons, but the group that did turn up were really positive and it was a really productive meeting, there were all sorts of services providers and authority figures there on the day. Information was shared from both sides meaning a positive outcome was reached. As a result of the event the Travellers found out what was already going on within Harrow that they could get involved.

Also, one of the ITMB interns, Tracy Sherlock was offered a job and is now the Parent Ambassador of Harrow for Irish Travellers. This represents a great success, as after three years of having parent ambassadors for other ethnic groups Tracy is the first for Irish Travellers.

She works closely in two schools with children from the Traveller community and is hoping to help them celebrate GRTHM which is in June by holding events in Harrow for Irish Travellers, also holding Intercultural events to raise cultural awareness and community cohesion

# Capacity Building:

## London Traveller Support Network



The fourth meeting of the ITMB TSN was held in mid December - much of the discussion focused on the future of Traveller Education in London, in the current context of drastic budget cuts

It was strongly felt that it would be appropriate and timely to convene a special event - with the 16h March being

proposed - on this issue, and while Traveller Education experts were still around to share their own experiences

Much discussion at the Network meeting related to what models of teaching and school ethos could be most valuable and accessible for school students from Traveller communities across London - discussion touched on whether the 'Free School' model as proposed by the Coalition could have any particular bearing on their needs

It was agreed that this could be an important part of the discussion at the meeting in March

In terms of discussion about the future of the LTSN itself - there was a strong consensus from delegates that it performed an important and useful role as a safe place for professionals supporting Travellers to share their experiences and their concerns.

# Capacity Building:

## Pacesetters



After months of working on a project with the Royal Free in Hampstead, several Traveller Women in and around North London are set to premier in a new DVD all about maternity care. As we go to press the top quality venue for the launch was under wraps but it's sure to be as glamorous as the participants who made the project happen.

From young mums to grandmothers Irish Traveller women have come together on this unique project to teach health care professionals about the culture and values of their community and to inform other women from the Travelling communities about their rights and responsibilities when it comes to maternity care.

The group got to see at firsthand the Maternity and Labour wards and even

the emergency and special needs facilities at the Royal Free Hospital. While there was a light hearted approach to some of the equipment in the dedicated labour rooms it was a real lesson for many of the women.

Even those who had already had children learnt something about options before and during the labour. One of the highlights for the participants was a visit from the British Red Cross who sent over a hunky trainer to give us a one day course in infant and child emergency first aid!

It wasn't just the Travellers who were learning though; lots of dedicated members of the Maternity department gave up their lunch breaks for cultural awareness and training sessions. Developed and delivered by the

Travellers themselves the sessions are dynamic and really got the staff thinking about both their thoughts on Travellers and how they could improve the service they offer now they knew more. Everyone single feedback form stated that they had learned a lot and were even more eager to learn more.

Pavee Ceilidh as mentioned above is a national event which ITMB arranges; this year London's event is to be held at the beautiful and well located Arts

**In this month's newsletter Ann O'Donnell writes about her experience as an intern working for ITMB.**

Hi my name is Ann O'Donnell I am an Irish Traveller living in Hertfordshire with my three girls. We have recently moved into a house and become housed Travellers. This for me after almost 20 years of living on caravan sites is taking some adjusting too. I am currently in the process of doing an L.L.B Law Degree at Hertfordshire University and hope to eventually qualify as a Barrister.

I work on a voluntary basis within the Gypsy and Irish Traveller Communities and I am a representative of the Irish Traveller Community on several ethnic minority groups and forums including The Diversity Engagement Forum and the Independent Advisory Group. I also work with the Hertfordshire Police Gypsy and Traveller Liaison Officer giving cultural awareness presentations within the force not only to help develop a deeper understanding and to educate, but also to encourage a better policing strategy within the Gypsy and Traveller

**Tracy Sherlock writes about how her experience working as an intern for ITMB has opened up other opportunities...**

My name is Tracy Sherlock I am a community development intern at ITMB.

I started in September and I am on the accredited community development course. I'm also involved in an interagency forum in harrow it was at one of the meetings there that I met the

communities. We also work with other organizations including local PCT's and Education staff as well as the Prison Service.

I first became involved with ITMB in August of last when I started their Community Development Course. This has been a very good learning curve for me as it has enabled me to develop my potential both personally and professionally.

This course has also given me a deeper understanding of my role within the Travelling Communities in Hertfordshire. I have since become a member of the ITMB Advisory Group and have just begun an Internship on their Policy Team. On the Policy team we are in the process of setting up a women's forum.

I have also begun an Internship with the Equality human Rights Commission which on their legal team. Each of those roles has empowered me to progress within a working environment and to work closely with Human Rights related projects which I feel passionately about.

EMAS ethnic minority achievement services and following this was offered a job in Harrow as parent liaison ambassador for the Irish travellers. I started my new job in January and I'm working with three different schools in harrow at the moment.

It's a great experience for me and my experience and knowledge I have gained with ITMB has help me a lot in the career choices I have made throughout the last year and has got me where I am today.

## ESRC Middlesex and ITMB PhD research project

My name is Tracy Mullan, and I am a PhD student at Middlesex University on placement at the ITMB. I began at Middlesex in October 2010, and before then I was working as a solicitor in North London, specialising in property law.

My legal training and knowledge of planning procedures is proving very valuable for my research subject, which is looking at the effects repeated evictions have on Travellers, and how those effects are different for men, women and children.

Later this year I am planning to interview around 25 men and women to find out their experiences of repeat eviction, and/or failed settlement in rented accommodation following homelessness applications.

Although I am trying to keep an open mind until then, I expect to be looking in particular at the effects for men and women on both physical health and emotional well-being, pregnancy care for young women, and access to education for children.

I also intend to be on site during some evictions, so I can see at firsthand what it means to be a traveller faced with forcible removal from property.

As preparation for doing my own research I am reading about various aspects of Travellers and evictions.

For example, the legal processes of eviction, the policy implications of relevant legislation, reports on Travellers' health, etc. The ITMB 'archives' are proving to be a valuable resource, particularly for policy literature.

I hope to be spending more time at the ITMB office from March onwards, and I'm also hoping to accompany ITMB staff on visits to those sites which face eviction, like Smithy Fen and Dale Farm.

In November of last year I was at Portcullis House for the launch of the report by ITMB on economic and social inclusion for Gypsies and Travellers, and also at the ITMB for the Conference the next day. These two events were very useful in terms of meeting valuable contacts.

I also want to make some contribution to the work the ITMB is doing, and have become involved in the Community Development course on healthcare.
